

Goals of the survey:


- 1. Get basic information on who rides transit & what its used for the most.
- 2. Get basic information on how transit is experienced and what improvements to advocate for.





Survey done online with flyers distributed in the Excelsior neighborhood from May - July, 2025. Surveys were in English, Spanish, Chinese, and Tagalog. We received a total of 337 responses.

1. What is your primary mode of transport:




2. What are your top 3 destinations when using your primary mode of transportation?




3. If you use public transit, how often do you use it?




4. If you have a personal vehicle or access to one, select what applies to you:




5. Is public transit in your neighborhood:


Written comments: 86 comments were made and here are several:

"I think the perception of safety needs to be improved on MUNI in order to increase ridership. I ride the 14 to and from work and experience all sorts of behavior/situations that would make anyone want to avoid transit- smoking on the bus, aggressive individuals, someone beating on the bus doors and breaking them, someone overdosing on the bus, graffiti kids, predatory dudes creeping on women - bus drivers aren't and shouldn't be expected to deal with these situations (they should be focused on safe driving and customer service), there is no BART police equivalent for MUNI. Riders are captive to wanting to get home/to work and it is highly risky to confront a random antisocial person on the bus. Honestly, it can be awful and I'd probably find another way to get to work if my fare wasn't subsidized."


It's really concerning to hear about such a significant deficit that the SFMTA is facing. A 30% reduction in transit services could have a huge impact on the daily lives of residents and the overall functioning of the city. It might lead to longer commute times, more traffic congestion on the roads as people might turn to private vehicles instead, and also affect those who rely on public transportation for essential trips like going to work, school or medical appointments.

My biggest issue is a lack of frequent and rapid transit coverage to the destinations I need outside of core Muni service. I can get on the 8 and get to BART. I can get on the 14/14R and get up mission. But if I want to go north of Market or west of Van Ness, cars are my only option for getting there in reasonable amounts of time.


9. What is your gender?




10. What is your age?

Summary:

The survey showed 56%'s primary mode of transportation was public transit with about 27% who uses mainly cars. The top 3 destinations were going to Work, Shopping, and Visiting Family and Friends. 68.55% of respondents take transit at least multiple times a week with 31.75% of respondents who use public transit every day.

78.75% of respondents have access to a car compared to only 22.26% who don't have access to a car. However, only 18.40% reported they only use their car to get around.

The respondents also stated that public transit in their neighborhood is "Good Enough" at 52.52% while 30.86% rated it as "Great."

The top 3 improvements that would help respondents ride Muni more often:

- 1. Reliable/More Frequent Service
- 2. Faster Trips
- 3. Improving Safety

<u>Demographic information of respondents summary:</u>

- About 50/50 self-identified as either Male or Female; there were 10 who identified as non-binary; & 4 people identified as Trans Male
- 30% identified as White, 22% Latinx, 19% Black, & 15.58% Asian
- 81.23% make less than \$104,900 (2025 100% of SF AMI for single is \$109,100)
- Majority of respondents between 18-49 years old (81.57%)

BIGGEST ISSUE TO ADDRESS:

Starting Summer 2026, SFMTA will be facing at least a \$322 Million deficit which represents about a third of the current operating budget.

The deficit was a result of lowered tax revenue from the general fund, less revenue from parking and reduced ridership.

This can result in more service cuts, reduced frequencies, higher fares, higher fees, and program/fare subsidies cut.

In order to maintain and improve current service, the deficit needs to be addressed.
